Primary Objective:

The role of the Prevocational Accreditation Committee (PAC) will reflect the direction and needs of the Medical Board of Australia (MBA) in relation to registration requirements for PGY1 and PGY2 doctors in the Northern Territory. A further role is to advocate for prevocational doctors and International Medical Graduates' (IMG) education and training opportunities through the implementation of nationally accredited standards.

The key functions of the PAC are:

- To make accreditation decisions and advise the NT Board of MBA and prevocational training providers on the requirements for prevocational training.
- To establish, implement, manage, monitor, evaluate and review an objective, robust and transparent system to accredit all prevocational doctors' training programs and terms.
- To maintain NT accreditation services to meet the Australian Medical Council (AMC) Accreditation Authority National Standards and reporting requirements to ensure Prevocational Medical Accreditation Services (PMAS) maintains its NT accreditation authority status.

Key Responsibilities of Role:

- Provide a point of contact for the community through leadership, guidance and advice in relation to the inclusion of the community or consumer's views on all issues relating to prevocational medical accreditation services in the Northern Territory.
- Contribute to the continuous review of prevocational accreditation policies and processes.
- Actively participate in the development, implementation and evaluation of strategic initiatives which support the accreditation system and processes.
- Be an advocate for the community needs and prevocational doctors' training opportunities.

Role knowledge, skills and experience:

- Knowledge and understanding of the Australian health care system;
- Recent or current consumer of the NT Health system;
- Have the ability and willingness to acquire knowledge of Australian prevocational medical accreditation systems/processes;
- Active community member with strong community networks and a sound understanding of local and national quality improvement processes and how they apply in workplaces.
